
Together Foundation Annual Report 2020-2021



Our effort to keep people smiling!

The highlight of this year has been Gift a Smile! -a project that we took up during the lockdown period. Team Together began online training in lockdown.

May 2020 onward.

Suddenly deprived of our work environment, Together Foundation began work on an online training programme that would be meaningful, interactive and engaging for our adults. This was fully supported by parents who sat by their adults and helped them become comfortable with online training. Events to felicitate our adults for both online training as well as vocational work were held. We are immensely grateful to our donors: H T Parekh Foundation and TATA Investment Corporation Limited for gracing the events and presenting certificates of competence to all the adults for the year 2020-2021.

Level 1: Building Rapport:

Teachers began with video calls to our adults and went on to conduct online classes. Language and communication being an integral part of training in all areas, teachers and students began 'Talktime': discussions about relevant topics like their families, festivals, seasons and birthdays. Such experience based programs ensured that our students were not deprived of the joy of celebrating festivals.

Level 2: Art & Craft:

Introduction of learning art online through enjoyable activities: greeting cards, finger painting, earbud painting and making things out of paper – bags, envelopes, collages.

Level 3: Online Celebrations:

Celebration of Independence Day online for which guests were invited and practice went on for an entire month.

Level 4: Drawing Classes:

Drawing classes with a specially designed curriculum followed by creative skill classes with the material used during drawing classes were begun. Students thoroughly enjoyed making bookmarks, torans and chandeliers, paper flowers and fabric painting on napkins and handkerchiefs.

Level 5: Cooking Online:

This mainly involved simple snack preparation and baking. Some of the items students learnt to prepare were plain cakes, sandwiches, sweets and milk shakes.

Level 6: Vocational Work:

We reintroduced vocational work by delivering and picking up job work and raw material for paper bags, to and from the homes of our adults. Online computer classes were begun to help them stay in touch with data entry.

Level 7: Fun and Games:

The boredom caused by lockdown and lack of variety in life was reduced to some extent by innovative games and contests which were not just fun filled but very interactive too. It kept their motor and communication skills as well as their attention span in shape.



Back to the Centre!

With a diligent hygiene and safety protocol in place, the centre started functioning fully from December 2020 onward. Online training continues for those students who are not able to rejoin due to various reasons. Students are taken in smaller groups at a time at the centre, in order to make social distancing possible.

Together Foundation received immense support from Perowshaw Dhunjishaw Bolton Charities and Rajni and Ramesh Tendulkar Charitable Trust in rebuilding work at the centre.



Training in the following vocational areas have been restarted:

1. Baking:

Our FSSAI certified bakery continues to be the focal point of the vision with which Together Foundation was born. The bakery team is working on a new healthy menu, suitable for all age groups and tastes.

2. Packing:

Packing of bakery products is an art, especially when it is done for gifting and celebrations. Many of our students are being trained for this work at different levels.

3. Embroidery:

The traditional art of embroidery can still be used in a variety of ways, both, as a means of vocation as well as for personal purposes. We have started with simple stitches which could be used on house hold items like pillow covers, napkins and table-tops.

4. Paper bag making:

Learning to make different kinds of paper bags continues. Since use of plastic bags is being discouraged, there is a good market for all types of paper bags and this skill can be developed later into a vocation.

5. Data entry:

Picking up where we had left before the closure of centre due to the pandemic: we started training in data entry with new zeal. Eight youngsters are currently being trained in two batches to take up data entry work for HDFC Bank.

6. Shop Management:

Getting trained to run a shop or assist in the shop owned by a family member/someone else can lead to good vocational opportunities. With this assumption, a small shop which was opened at the centre a couple of years back has reopened now. Apart from the items made at the centre, it also sells snacks and juices freshly made by the students. The older students are learning to organise the shop, interact with the customers in a civil manner, take the order, serve them whatever is asked for and basic money management (those who can)
